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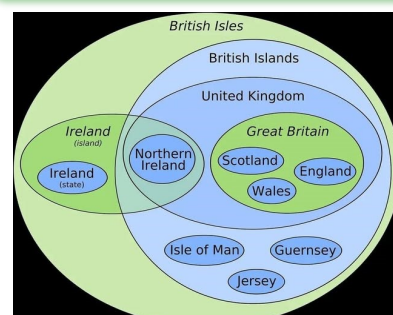

Estelle was constant in her supervision and took care of her till the end.

She had a grooming salon in Klosterneuburg until 2011 and was the chairman of the local animal protection association.

She loved to travel and meet people. Her great musical love was Elvis Presley. She also loved lots of good conversation over a Gin and Tonic!!

During a visit to our sponsored children, Johanna fell in love with Kilifi and it became her new hometown!

Unfortunately the cancer that had been in her body for some time became so aggressive that it took Johanna from us far too soon."

Ingrid went on to say what a nice idea it was to have this Farewell for her friend and to thank Estelle for arranging it.

So now she is gone, we can only remember her smiling face and her wonderful warm personality.

Eldoret Branch had a very interesting talk by William Kimasop who is retiring as Wildlife Conservator to the Rift Valley counties. After telling us about the abundance of wildlife in the area including nearly 500 Elephants in the Rimoi National Reserve in the Kerio Valley He



encouraged members to be on the lookout for many millions of European Birds migrating south for the winter, they normally pass through Kenya during November. These birds augment the 650 odd species native to Uasin Gishu County, it was during such migration that the world record of the number of species of birds spotted in 24 hours was made in Kenya! Kimasop has always been interested in history so we gifted him a copy of "They Made it Their Home" the story of the EAWL tapestries.

Following the meeting Kimasop reached out to EAWL requesting assistance in his latest project "Young Explorer Club"

2025 EWCA Area Conference Report

The **East, West & Central Area Conference** took place from 9th to 11th September 2025 at WEAL House. **World President** Mrs. Magdie de Kock, **Deputy World President** Judith Juma, **Area President** Clare Jethwa and **Advocacy Director** Nick Newland-Esner were all present, along with representatives from:

EAWL, WE BELIEVE CBO, Boya Women Support Group (Kenya)
Youth and Women for Opportunities (Uganda);
Tanzania Development People Organization (Tanzania)
Plus a few non-member guests and several people joined online



Singers from **the Ghetto Classics**, opened the Conference with a beautiful rendering of the Kenya National Anthem, the East Africa Community Anthem and the ACWW Anthem, the Song of Peace. This was followed by a welcoming address from **the National Chairman of the EAWL, Mrs. Stephanie Mwite**. The **Area President** then greeted those present with a number of goodwill messages from members of the **ACWW Board**. The **World President** then formally opened the Conference.



The **FAO** representative who was scheduled to make the first keynote speech had to cancel at the last minute, this gave more time for reports from the **Area President** and **Member Societies** which generated many interesting discussions.

The conference included presentations from:

Julia Kamau of **Seed Savers Network Kenya**, who told us about the SSNK's work empowering farmers by providing them with the resources and knowledge needed to cultivate diverse crops, thereby preserving biodiversity and adapting to changing climate conditions. Julia was accompanied by two women farmers who told us how much their connection with Seed Savers Network had transformed their lives and their standing in their families and the community. It was heartwarming to learn that Maggie, a 47-year-old woman who dropped out of school in her teens, has now resumed her education after bringing up 3 children of her own!

Zipporah Kamau from **WE BELIEVE CBO**, a grassroots initiative based in Kabete Constituency just outside Nairobi which is dedicated to empowering women, girls, and youth through education, advocacy, and community development. Founded by a former teenage mother who overcame numerous barriers to attain higher education, the

organisation exists to inspire and equip marginalised groups to realise their full potential. The speaker focused her presentation on **Gender Based Violence and Female Genital Mutilation**, delicate subjects which she approached with great sensitivity.

Zara Benosa, co-founder of **Farm to Feed** which was set up in 2020 as a COVID food relief effort and has evolved into an entity that combats **food loss and food waste** by guaranteeing to purchase the farmers' entire harvests and selling them on to organisations such as hotels, hospitals and educational institutions that cater to large numbers. The network of small-scale farmers whom they serve stretches across Kenya.

Several sessions over the three days were dedicated to **the work of ACWW**, with the **World President** giving a keynote address and the **Advocacy Director** explaining how the Association represents and advises its member societies on the global stage. The **Deputy World President** gave an overview of the **Coordinators Programme** and encouraged society members to submit their nominations. (EAWL's coordinator is National Chair Stephanie)

The late **Irene Chinje**, former Deputy World President and Area President for East, West & Central Africa was memorialised. The **Deputy World President** and the current **Area President** both spoke of their interaction with Irene and how she had influenced their engagement with ACWW. **Nick Newland** ended with a touching and beautiful tribute to a woman who gave so much to ACWW even when she was gravely ill.

The Conference ended with an address from the **Director of the UNESCO Regional Office for Eastern Africa, Louise Haxthausen**, who was accompanied by her assistant, a gentleman who hails from Cameroon. Both spoke about **UNESCO's** work with women in the region, which covers an amazingly wide spectrum.



To close the Conference the **World President** congratulated the **Area President** on a job well done. Habi Joseph gave a very moving vote of thanks in Kiswahili. The **Area President** then led the group in singing once again the beautiful **ACWW Anthem, the Song of Peace**. Clare as **Area President** would like to thank everyone who helped organise the Conference including:

NAKURU BRANCH Centenary Year

Much of Nakuru Branch's history from 1925, our inception year, to around 2011 has been lost to us other than what had been captured in "They Made It Their Home" & the Blue Book Celebrating 70 years of the League. However, **Sally Joslyn** appeared with a gem at a recent meeting a very tea stained thin booklet "E.A.W.L Fifty Years" made in 1967, which has enriched our branch history a little further!

From it we learnt the League was instrumental in bringing about a comprehensive Children's Act in the 1950's which led to the creation of the Child Welfare Society & the Adoption Society. The hardships & challenges borne by rural women & children back then were alleviated & brought to relevant authorities & societies by the Europeans in the farming districts. Farmers' wives, many living remotely without the extensive road & communication networks we all now take for granted, dealt daily with, sickness, accidents, baby delivery, fostering, better child nutrition/hygiene as well as assistance for orphaned children etc.. Nakuru Branch back in the 1930's already had established an African baby clinic & held regular sewing classes for women.

Nakuru sits in the heart of the Rift Valley farming community. Over the



last 50 years, Nakuru branch has essentially absorbed the remaining members from outlying towns like Njoro, Mau Narok, Bahati, Solai, Rongai, Londiani, Molo, Turi & Ravine as the branches closed due to the farm buy ups back in the 70s. We still have members in our branch who are descendants of these earlier generations, still continuing to work to better the lives of vulnerable women & children. One such inspirational example is the **Nightingale** family with **Kenana Knitters**, which provides a safe/baby friendly, educative working environment together with a finished product market, both local & international, for rural women who produce, spin and knit iconic African animals & beautiful natural wool/cotton clothing items. Our main historical charities supported over many, many years are: **Ngala School for Deaf; Arap Moi Childrens' Home; SCANN Street Boys; & Nakuru Hospice.**

We also assist in small ways other charitable initiatives focused on improving life for Kenyan women & children in & around Nakuru that our members have introduced to us:

Crown of Beauty, Nakuru with their vibrant African print, beautifully sewn household items & clothes;

Brighter Communities Worldwide, Londiani who alleviate hardships for rural families with medical, sanitation, income generation & climate change adaptation education & assistance;

Wendo Retreat Bahati who run educative community initiatives & special needs camps;

Our own **Redempta Muibu** with 'Save the Girl' helping adolescents navigate puberty;

The Beehive Shelters on Milimani supporting teenage mothers;

There are two stand out ladies who simply must be remembered in our 100th year:



Pauline Joslyn who chaired Nakuru Branch for a considerable time through the 1970s up her passing in August 2013. They say: "Behind every good woman there is always another good woman (more often many good women!)" - Pauline always had a reliable backup in

Fien Button who served as Secretary cum Treasurer & stood in as Chair every 3rd year to comply with EAWL's constitution when no one else was forthcoming. Pauline was a league legend in Nakuru's history & the driving force behind the annual, major fund raising event The Nakuru War Memorial Hospital Fete. The EAWL Nakuru branch always ran the Tea Tent where copious cups of reviving tea were served & the ladies best bakes were on sale for probably only 20/- a slice! Pauline was Chairman of the hospital Appeals Committee from 1976 to 2013. The children of Ngala Deaf School & Arap Moi Children's Home fondly called Pauline "**Cucu**" - Kikuyu for "Grandmother". Pauline received an MBE from the Queen for her long-service & dedication to her EAWL & Hospital work. We have a tree planted in the Deaf school premises commemorating Pauline & the EAWL Centenary, we plan to renovate the plaque to include reference to Nakuru Branch's centenary.



Jill (Harris) Simpson - initially a Bahati/Nakuru member for many years before moving and joining Naivasha/Gilgil Branch. In the 1980s she organized/acted, in conjunction with the Mandeleo ya Wanawake & Kenya's Family Planning Association, a mobile unit for a comprehensive baby/child immunization programme in the Rift Valley focusing on Polio eradication. One of her back up volunteers was Veronica, wife of the well remembered family Physician Dr. Malakooti. Along with other EAWL ladies with nursing experience they went out with Jill & the mobile unit to villages & schools in the Rift Valley.

In her later years Jill turned her attention to raising money for oldies & orphan/street children - Kalulu (Coast) & Sidia (Gilgil/Naivasha) Homes. My own Mum Pam Eccles accompanied her on one such fundraiser, a Mega Granny Walk with camels along the Tsavo river East to West doing 20 kms plus per day along with many walkers well into their 70s. Jill also received an MBE from the Queen for her tireless charitable work.

Homecrafts started in 1927 & was judged/displayed in EAWL tents at all major town agricultural shows to showcase members artistic & crafting talents. Recently rebranded the Festival of Arts & Crafts this only moved to Anderson Hall, Weal House in 1983. **Sally Joslyn** - **Pauline's** daughter in law has been Nakuru's main coordinator & major knitting entrant in this creative initiative for many years.

We learnt from Dr Silverstein's recently published, a must read memoir, "Heartbeat" that the Arap Moi Childrens' home, situated next to Nakuru City's Westside Mall Shopping Centre, incorporates the original Nakuru Jewish Synagogue. Dr Silverstein's sons helped redecorate the main building and Star of David as part of their Bar Mitzvah year's community service.

In our era, we have another inspirational Kenyan lady of whom we are very proud - **Salome Naliaka** - **Jessica Jensen's** cook extraordinaire from **Kampi Kitchen** who has been entering marmalade & preserves into the Homecraft Exhibition for us for over 20 years, regularly winning firsts. She won the Preserves Bowl for our Branch in 2024.

To commemorate our 2025 Centenary this year we have re- printed our Nakuru Tapestry into an All-Occasion card & updated "our story" from the original card. **Please do support us by purchasing a 4 card pack or more to assist us in raising funds for our charities. We have also sponsored **Haradari Nursery/Wendo Arboretum** to plant 100 indigenous trees for our 100 years in Bahati Forest - a re-afforestation project that Charles Wahome of Wendo Retreat has been engaged in for 17 years.

And finally to round up, a funny short exert from our Minutes of Tuesday 20th July 2010 at St. Christopher's Hall (where members met for a monthly tea from time immemorial!)

"The Nanyuki Up country Council was enjoyed by us all - 9 members travelled by bus & Janet & Jessica by car. Travelling through the bush Janet said they had met with a lion & a charging buffalo! They also had a puncture but arrived home safely!" **Where else but in Africa - so here's to our intrepid EAWL NAKURU ladies!**
